I am delighted to be writing my first letter to you as Chairman. Who would have thought that a year on from the last AGM we find ourselves living through these very strange times? It has given us the chance to reflect on how lucky we are to be living on our beloved Island and enjoy the freedoms we currently experience. Like me, many of you will have family across and be aware how they are living through quite different circumstances.

We are delighted that so many of you have supported The Friends during this time by continuing to renew your membership. For that we are most grateful. Your membership helps to contribute towards preserving our unique cultural heritage and also supports the acquisitions and conservation of the National Collection. This is now even more important with the lack of visitors to our shores. We hope you made good use of your membership by visiting our heritage sites to help make it worthwhile keeping them open. The air bridge to Guernsey provided our members a chance to visit their National Trust and use our membership card under the new reciprocal agreement.

Throughout the lockdown many of you enjoyed the newsletters circulated by Nicola and she very much appreciated hearing from members, here and abroad, providing feedback on how much they enjoyed being kept in touch with news and events. The events programme got underway again in August with a series of outdoor events and I'm pleased to say were all very well supported. Our first indoor event took place on Friday 2nd October and was fully booked.

Having been on a number of the events myself, I know how much they are enjoyed by everyone and am grateful to Nicola for always thinking of new and interesting things to keep us all entertained.

Dear Friend

The AGM of the Friends of Manx National Heritage and the accompanying paperwork always gives me the opportunity to look back at the last year and take a snapshot of our activity. One letter isn't space enough to list everything that has been going on so it forces me to consider what the highlights are.

Much of what we do is highly visible to the public and we pride ourselves in being open and accessible. We've continued to mount some really great exhibitions such as The Art of Nature at the House of Manannan and The Luxury of Time at the Manx Museum. They celebrated completely different things and were targeted at different audiences – but both were fascinating and rewarding to see.

Making more of a splash this year have been the gardens at the Grove, Cregneash and Rushen Abbey gardens. With the support of funds and volunteers from FMNH the grounds at both sites have begun to look amazing. The planting schemes look different at each season of the year and so the gardens are being visited more frequently than previously by local people. I look forward to similar work starting this coming winter at Castle Rushen.

Also visible to the public but this time to an international audience is our digital activity. We took the decision in March to remove the subscription to the Newspapers available through the iMuseum. This resulted in a significant jump in usage and whilst it was a bit of an experiment we were really pleased with the response and have made the decision permanent. Other online initiatives have been a new collaboration with the Google Arts and Culture Channel – which is a charitable venture making information on museums and historic sites around the world available. We have three exhibits so far: Our sculpture collection; our sketchbooks exhibit; and a selection from our TT collection.

The sculpture exhibit included the amazing portrait of James Brown, editor of the Manx Times, by Joseph William Swynnerton. There are very few sculptures of people of colour in the British Isles and the Black Lives Matter campaign during recent months has reminded us that the Isle of Man is part of a wider story and can't stand aside from these critical issues.

Behind the scenes we have continued to develop schemes either to repair our buildings or improve our facilities. Some of these are high profile and attract considerable interest – such as the Nautical Museum or the Courtroom at Castle Rushen. Others have proceeded quietly, such as the refurbishment of Thornbank, the Baillie Scott House in Douglas. This

now has planning permission and we are about to go to tender for the buildings works. Thornbank is very generously supported by FMNH. The other scheme you are directly supporting through the acquisition of material is the new TT Gallery at the Manx Museum. We started to prepare the gallery for this in January and construction work will start in earnest this winter coming. Concept designs are now in place and we remain on track to open this gallery in May 2022. It will focus on the human stories behind the course and the machinery, and will be a world-class exhibit.

Friends remain important to MNH and we've continued to engage with you during the year. I was delighted that we were able to establish reciprocal arrangements with the Guernsey National Trust this summer and welcome as a result a new audience. I know many of you have taken advantage of this new link and I hope it will continue.

I couldn't complete this letter without reference to Covid-19 and the impact this has had on the Island. You may not know that some MNH staff were seconded to other roles and I am proud that so many of my team contributed to the efforts to save lives and support their community during the early part of the pandemic. Museums and heritage services are not emergency services and we rightly take a back seat during a crisis. However, the mental health and well-being of our community is hugely important and so we tried our best to provide activities online at first and then open up our sites as soon as it was safe to do so. We were also mindful of the impact on our commercial tenants and cafés so we waived rents to protect local jobs.

The financial impact on MNH of closed borders and other restrictions has been substantial with the loss of over £1m of income likely this year alone. We have a very positive relationship with our sponsoring Government Department and the IOM Treasury and we have been given assurances that we can continue to deliver our services for the foreseeable future.

However, we live in very uncertain times and the next few years may need us to be even more flexible and fleet of foot in responding quickly to changing circumstances and priorities. We may not be able to satisfy everyone but I hope that FMNH will stand at our side as we go forward. I remain grateful for the support from FMNH – which is not simply financial or through volunteering but through kind words, moral support and speaking up for the organisation and the team. Thank you.
