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Dear Friend

This is my first opportunity to engage with Manx National Heritage's wider family of the Friends of Manx National Heritage and my first priority is to thank you for your ongoing support of the important work carried out by the dedicated MNH teams across the Island.

Since arriving on the Isle of Man in early August to take up my new post as Executive Director, I have been very rapidly immersed in the role and Island life. In the few short weeks I have been here I have received the warmest of welcomes and am experiencing a genuine desire from everyone I meet to work collaboratively with MNH to achieve the best outcomes for all involved in our work protecting our heritage for future generations.

For the past nearly 7 years, I have worked for the National Trust for Scotland and for the last 18 months of my time with the NTS, I was deeply involved with dealing with the enormity of the breadth and depth of the impact of Covid-19 on the Heritage sector in Scotland. Latterly, I was avidly watching events unfolding on the Isle of Man and could see the similarities of challenges being faced and overcome by MNH.

Having been in post for just a few weeks at the time of writing this letter to the Friends of MNH, I have asked my colleagues on the senior management team for details of highlights of the past 12 months for their respective areas of responsibility. I hope you will be as fascinated and delighted as I have been to learn about some of the meaningful initiatives MNH has been involved with over the past year.

Visitors to MNH sites - in 2020, despite the late start of our Season and closed borders we were still able to welcome over 30,000 visitors to our sites including 2,735 visits from FMNH Members and 783 visits from reciprocal organisation members which included some from Guernsey.

In 2021 MNH has faced 93 days of Covid lockdowns with our borders remaining closed until 28 June. There was immediate interest and strong demand from off-Island groups and we welcomed the first of these group visits to Peel Castle on 29 June. MNH sites officially opened to the public on 16 July and to date we have welcomed over 45,000 visitors through our doors with just over 2,000 FMNH member visits recorded so far and over 7,500 reciprocal visits.

The UK staycation market has had a very positive effect on travel to the Isle of Man which is perceived as a 'safe' destination by UK independent travellers and Tour Operators. This trend has also been reflected in the number of bookings for our Holiday accommodation at Eary Cushlin <u>https://www.islandescapes.im/property/562726</u> and Yn Thie Thooit at the Lhen <u>https://www.islandescapes.im/property/562727</u>, where we are seeing excellent occupancy rates continuing into the autumn months ahead.

FMNH's volunteers provided vital support for some of our key events during the year including Little Peoples Picnic and the Tanya Anderson workshop at Rushen Abbey and a host of Volunteers are lined up once again to help us deliver this year's ever popular Heritage Open Days in the first two weekends of October. An enormous thank you for your support at these events.

Executive Director MMP Sept 2021, letter to Eriende of Manx National Heritage

During 2020/21 the **LiDAR analysis and evaluation of the Calf of Man** and the Meayll Peninsular was completed. This was a LiDAR-based survey of the Cregneash area and the Calf of Man, including land owned by Manx National Heritage and some areas of privately-owned farmiand. The study area extended over some 685 hectares, (425 hectares of which is owned by MNH, the rest being privately owned).

The LiDAR-based survey was also informed by historic mapping and aerial photographs. It has revealed a significant number of features which have been previously unrecorded, over 360 in total, and also thrown new light on **so**me features which had been previously identified.

Central Western part of the Island

The report will help to inform an historic environment management section in a Calf of Man Management Plan and in due course it can be used to add records to the **Isle of Man Historic Environment Record (IOMHER).** If you are not already familiar with this new facility, please do visit the MNH website <u>https://isleofmanher.im/</u> where you will find further fascinating detail and a wealth of information. The MNH HER website went live in March this year and if you have not yet had an opportunity to browse the site please do take a moment to log on, where you will find an excellent tutorial video with useful tips on how to get the best from the site. Gardens at the Grove

- Appointment of John-Paul Walker to the position of Historic Buildings Architect. John-Paul joined MNH in July and is the only professionally accredited conservation architect on the Isle of Man.
- Launched in March 2021, the Isle of Man Historic Environment Record (IOMHER) is the primary information service for the historic environment of the Isle of Man and will inform its future management and enjoyment.

The IOMHER includes all statutorily protected Ancient Monuments and all war memorials as well as more than 200 medieval carved stone crosses; 200 medieval chapels ('keeills') and burial grounds;

more than 300 Neolithic and Bronze Age prehistoric burial sites between 1,500-5,500 years old; over 100 medieval upland seasonal settlement sites or 'shielings'; over 500 mills and water-management features associated with them; and over 1,500 records of prehistoric finds including worked fiint and pottery.

'Unpath'd Waters: Marine and Maritime Collections in the UK - MNH were approached by Historic England (HE) to become a partner in a potential new maritime heritage project. The project covers three geographical areas; the North Sea, the Solent and adjacent English Channel, and the Irish Sea. It aims to involve local and national heritage organisations to explore and resolve the complexities of joining up maritime and marine collections (datasets, maps and charts, documents, archives, surveys, artefacts) in order to help the public access, understand and even co-create a more complete British-Isles wide marine heritage record.

Although no funding will be available to MNH directly, collaboration with HE and its partners in this initiative will allow cross-organisational knowledge-sharing (including IT considerations such as the incorporation of maritime sites into the Isle of Man Historic Environment Record (IOMHER) and a raised awareness of the significance of the Island's maritime heritage, both on and off-Island.

Digital Collections

Unlocking Our Sound Heritage Project 2020-21

This is a British Library led project to digitise sound archives across the British Isles. More than 600 recordings from MNH collections were transported to National Museums Northern Ireland in October 2020 for digitisation. A digital volunteer listening project was established in 2021 to transcribe and catalogue the archive in advance of release to iMuseum and later in 2022 the main British Library website. The 60 plus volunteers that have engaged with this project are essential to help us achieve our vision to improve accessibility and promotion of the sound archives collections.

IOM on Film

Throughout 2021 we have been putting various clips from our film archives onto iMuseum. Predominantly from the camera of J. Royston, subjects include boxing, flower shows and a trip to the Douglas Art School. The films, dating from the 1930s to the 1950s, were originally digitised with the financial assistance of FMNH back in 2010.

 The TT Gallery has made significant progress during the year despite the challenges of lockdown. The detailed design scheme of the new gallery was completed in December 2020 and good progress is being made with Graphic design.

We have also engaged specialist textile conservator Zenzie Tinker to provide advice in relation to the mounting of costumes and textiles for the gallery. In September 2019 boxes of leathers, helmets and boots were taken to Zenzie Tinker's conservation studio in Brighton to begin their conservation journey. We will provide updates on Zenzie's work over the next 6 months and are grateful to the FMNH for their financial support for the conservation of these items.

Although there were no major purchases in the year for the new gallery we did acquire key sections of the TT Scoreboard when it was dismantled at the Grandstand. The scoreboard will provide a magnificent backdrop to the collections and the human stories that we will tell and will definitely evoke a sense of place.

- Exhibitions Programme despite the disruption of lockdowns we were able to deliver four
 exhibitions this year including Kevin Atherton The Works, a retrospective for this Manx born artist
 exploring the universal questions in life in a challenging, intriguing and often humorous way. The
 island is at the core of Kevin's character and the complicated nature of the relationship he has with
 the land of his birth was only exaggerated by the circumstances of 2021 which meant that he never
 actually got to physically visit his own retrospective from his current home in England.
- At the House of Manannan we were able to work in partnership with the Island's Creative Network
 to open an exhibition called *Boundaries*. Work by more than 60 local artists explored the theme of
 boundaries a title which had been proposed long before we were aware of Coivd 19 and the
 physical boundaries that became such a part of our lives. The exhibition shows the artist constantly
 exploring boundaries and their ever-changing style, materials, cognitive and aesthetic processes.
- Treasure in February 2021 a stunning collection of Viking Age artefacts was declared Treasure by the Isle of Man Coroner of Inquests, Mrs Jayne Hughes. The internationally significant find consists of a gold arm-ring, a large silver brooch, at least one silver armband and other associated finds, buried around AD 950, all discovered in late 2020 by metal detectorist Kath Giles.

The hoard went on display in the Viking & Medieval Gallery at the Manx Museum prior to valuation and further conservation work. Due to the significance of these finds we will seek to acquire them for the national collections. MNH also acquired another Viking assemblage – two highly decorated brooches and a glass bead – discovered in 2018 and declared treasure in July 2020.

• **Calf of Man stamps** – we worked with IOM Post Office regarding a Calf of Man 10 stamp issue which also celebrated the 70th anniversary of the founding of Manx National Trust in 1951.

I hope the above snapshot of a cross section of activities over the past year provides an insight into just some of the breadth of work undertaken by MNH.

In challenging times such as the past 18 months of the Coronavirus, we are reminded of the importance of providing support and encouragement to one another. The level of commitment at MNH, from Trustees, staff and volunteers across all sites, serves to highlight how amazing things can be achieved when we work together to achieve a common purpose. The support of the Friends of Manx National Heritage is particularly important during such times, when working together collaboratively can make such a difference and have such a positive impact.

I look forward to meeting members of the Friends of Manx National Heritage and once again, thank you for your invaluable support of the important work undertaken by MNH to protect and promote the rich heritage of the Isle of Man, safeguarding our amazing places and spaces for future generations to enjoy.
